4. The key to our relationship with God

“Prayer is continuing a conversation that God has started through his Word and his grace, which eventually becomes a full encounter with him.” (Keller)

With all wisdom and understanding, ⁹ he made known to us the mystery of his will according to his good pleasure, which he purposed in Christ, ¹⁰ to be put into effect when the times reach their fulfilment—to bring unity to all things in heaven and on earth under Christ.

¹¹ In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will, ¹² in order that we, who were the first to put our hope in Christ, might be for the praise of his glory. ¹³ And you also were included in Christ when you heard the message of truth, the gospel of your salvation. When you believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory.

Session 2: Does prayer make any difference? The power of prayer

Does prayer make any difference?

1. We know God more fully

2. We know ourselves more truly

- a. We are convicted of sin

*“There is no one righteous, not even one;
¹¹ there is no one who understands;
there is no one who seeks God. (Rom 3:10-11)*

- b. We grasp our complete dependence on God

He is completely in control of all the world, from beginning to end.

*“Where were you when I laid the earth’s foundation?
Tell me, if you understand.*

*⁵ Who marked off its dimensions? Surely you know!
Who stretched a measuring line across it?*

*⁶ On what were its footings set,
or who laid its cornerstone—*

*⁶ Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is
forgotten by God. ⁷ Indeed, the very hairs of your head are all
numbered. Don’t be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows.

Our lives are completely dependent on him

*You discern my going out and my lying down;
you are familiar with all my ways.*

⁴ *Before a word is on my tongue
you, Lord, know it completely. (Psalm 139:3-5)*

*I lie down and sleep; I wake again, because the Lord sustains me. (Ps
3:5)*

“I’m actually managing my life through my daily prayer time. I’m shaping my heart, my work, my family – in fact, everything that is dear to me – through prayer in fellowship with my heavenly Father. I’m doing that because I don’t have control over my heart and life or the hearts and lives of those around me. But God does.” (Miller)

c. Our hearts, priorities and motivations change

*May these words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart
be pleasing in your sight,
Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer. (Psalm 19:14)*

“Prayer *does* change things, all kinds of things. But the most important thing it changes is us. As we engage in this communion with God more deeply and come to know the One with whom we are speaking more intimately, that growing knowledge of God reveals to us all the more brilliantly who we are and our need to change in conformity to Him. Prayer changes us profoundly.” (R.C. Sproul, *The Prayer of the Lord*)

Why don't we pray?

1. We forget who God is

a. We forget God's goodness

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰ For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28-30)

Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you. (1 Peter 5:7)

*Return to the Lord your God,
for he is gracious and compassionate,
slow to anger and abounding in love,
and he relents from sending calamity. (Joel 2:16)*

b. We forget God's power

"Lord, the God of our ancestors, are you not the God who is in heaven? You rule over all the kingdoms of the nations. Power and might are in your hand, and no one can withstand you." (2 Chron 20:6)

Your ways, God, are holy.

What god is as great as our God?

*¹⁴ You are the God who performs miracles;
you display your power among the peoples. (Psalm 77:13-14)*

¹⁶ For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile. (Rom 1:17)

2. We forget who we are

a. We forget our sin

*For I know my transgressions,
and my sin is always before me.*

⁴ *Against you, you only, have I sinned
and done what is evil in your sight;
so you are right in your verdict
and justified when you judge.*

⁵ *Surely I was sinful at birth,
sinful from the time my mother conceived me. (Psalm 51:3-5)*

b. We forget our dependence

“If you are not praying, then you are quietly confident that time, money and talent are all you need in life.” (Miller)

Some struggles with prayer

“Prayer is always hard work, and often an agony. We sometimes have to wrestle even in order to pray... While God can and will grant times of peace and tranquillity, no Christian outgrows the need to struggle and persevere in prayer.” (Keller)

1. No time

“If you are sick and tired of feeling so dreadfully busy and are looking for a one-point plan to help restore order to your life, this is the best advice I know: devote yourself to the word of God and prayer... no single practice brings more discipline and peace to life than sitting at the feet of Jesus.” (Kevin DeYoung, *Crazy Busy*)

“Many assume that the spiritual person is unruffled by life, unfazed by pressure...even a cursory glance at Jesus’ life reveals a busy life... If we love people and have the power to help, then we are going to be busy. Learning to pray doesn’t offer us a less busy life; it offers us a less busy heart. In the midst of outer busyness we can develop an inner quiet.” (Miller)

2. Not interested

“Pray until we pray” (Carson)

3. I can’t

‘Come messy’ (Miller)

4. Disappointment & sadness

“Unfulfilled prayer can serve as a means to produce far deeper and more valuable benefits than those we originally requested. Unfulfilled prayer can teach us patience and contentment, surrendering and bowing before God... Unfulfilled prayer can serve to teach us humility and dependency, to trust more in God and less in self.” (Beeke & Beeke)

Some thoughts on lament

1. God is inclined to those who are hurting

*The Lord is close to the brokenhearted
and saves those who are crushed in spirit. (Psalm 34:18)*

2. Scripture shows us how to lament

¹ *I cry aloud to the Lord;
I lift up my voice to the Lord for mercy.
² I pour out before him my complaint;
before him I tell my trouble. (Psalm 142:1-2)*

*How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever?
How long will you hide your face from me?
² How long must I wrestle with my thoughts
and day after day have sorrow in my heart? (Psalm 13:1-2b)*

“Anyone can complain. Christians can lament. They can talk to God about their condition and ask him to change things because they have a relationship with him. To lament is to be utterly honest with God because we trust him. Biblical lament affirms that suffering is real and spiritually significant, but not hopeless.” (Kendal & Haug)

3. Community lament

“The way of Christian fellowship is empathy, which means we must not assume that everyone around us is fine. In our conversations, we must listen for complaints and cries and help transform them into laments. In our gathered worship, we must acknowledge the hurting and leave room for struggle and silence. In our counsel, we must pray with and over and for the hurting. This is essential to authentic Christian faith: “Bear one another’s burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ” (Gal 6:2)” (Kendal & Haug)

4. From lament to praise can take time

“Prayer is awe, intimacy, struggle – yet the way to reality. There is nothing more important, or harder, or richer, or more life-altering. There is absolutely nothing so great as prayer.” (Keller)

Discuss how you would talk to a friend who says:

- “My life is too busy, I’ll pray when I have more time.”
- “Ever since my diagnosis, I can’t pray, I can’t find the words.”
- “I have been praying for my sister to be converted for 30 years, I’m giving up, it’s too painful.”
- “The only thing I ever prayed was that God would keep him safe – and now this has happened. God has failed me.”
- “Maybe I didn’t pray hard enough? Did I fail in prayer and so God didn’t answer?”

Close in prayer together, praying for those who struggle with prayer and praising God that he hears, he works for our good and that he answers prayer according to his will.

Session 3: How do I pray?

The practice of prayer

“I will tell you as best I can what I do personally when I pray. May our dear Lord grant to you and to everybody to do it better than I!” (Luther, *A Simple Way to Pray*, 1535)

1. Pray the bible

“Our prayers should arise out of immersion in the Scriptures. We should “plunge ourselves into the sea” of God’s language, the Bible. We should listen, study, think, reflect, and ponder the Scriptures until there is an answering response in our hearts and minds. It may be one of shame or of joy or of confusion or of appeal – but that response to God’s speech is then truly *prayer* and should be given to God.” (Keller)

Luther’s 4 garland of four interwoven strands:

- Instruction
- Thanksgiving
- Confession
- Petition

⁶Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.⁷ And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Phil 4:6-7)

“If you can’t turn a bible passage into prayer, you probably can’t put it into practice.” (Adam)

a. The Lord's prayer (Matthew 6:9-13)

"It is the very best prayer, even better than the Psalter, which is so very dear to me. It is surely evident that a real master composed and taught it. What a great shame that the prayer of such a master is prattled and chattered so irreverently all over the world!" (Luther, *A Simple Way to Pray*, 1535)

"...get accustomed to praying this plain, ordinary, Christian prayer. The longer one devotes one's self to this kind of praying, the more sweet and joyous it becomes. (Luther, *Little Prayer Book*, 1522)

Pray through the Lord's prayer together, breaking down each section and expanding on it. Consider praise, confession, thankfulness and request.

'Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
¹⁰ your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as it is in heaven.
¹¹ Give us today our daily bread.
¹² And forgive us our debts,
as we also have forgiven our debtors.
¹³ And lead us not into temptation,
but deliver us from the evil one.'
(Matthew 6:9b-13)

b. Pauls' prayers

³ I thank my God every time I remember you. ⁴ In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy ⁵ because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, ⁶ being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus. (Phil 1:3-6)

⁹ And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, ¹⁰ so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, ¹¹ filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God. (Phil 1:9-11)

⁹ For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you. We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives, ¹⁰ so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, ¹¹ being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, ¹² and giving joyful thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of his holy people in the kingdom of light. (Col 1:9-12)

² We always thank God for all of you and continually mention you in our prayers. ³ We remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labour prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Thess 1:2-3)

³ We ought always to thank God for you, brothers and sisters, and rightly so, because your faith is growing more and more, and the love all of you have for one another is increasing. ⁴ Therefore, among God's churches we boast about your perseverance and faith in all the persecutions and trials you are enduring. (2 Thess 1:3-4)

¹¹ With this in mind, we constantly pray for you, that our God may make you worthy of his calling, and that by his power he may bring to fruition your every desire for goodness and your every deed prompted by faith. ¹² We pray this so that the name of our Lord Jesus may be glorified in you, and you in him, according to the grace of our God and the Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Thess 1:11-12)

“If we learn to pray with Paul, we will learn to pray for others. We will see it is part of our job to approach God with thanksgiving for others and with intercessions for others. In short, our praying will be shaped by our profound desire to seek what is best for the people of God” (Carson)

Pray for each other and your church community, using these passages as prompts. Consider praise, confession, thankfulness and request.

c. Psalms

“Without immersion in God’s words, our prayer may not be merely limited and shallow but also untethered from reality. We may be responding not to the real God but to what we wish God and life to be like. Indeed, if left to themselves our hearts *will* tend to create a God who doesn’t exist.” (Keller)

b. Range of prayer topics

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Phil 4:6)

And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. (Eph 6:18)

Could include:

- God
- Yourself
- Close relationships (family, friends)
- Your life (church, work)
- Those working for God elsewhere
- Issues in the world
- Issues of today

3. Pray continually

Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus. (1 Thess 5:16-18)

“Never resist the urge to pray” (Challies)

4. Some practical thoughts

- Structure helps
- Resources help
- Routines help

“It is a good thing to let prayer be the first business of the morning and the last at night. Diligently guard against those false, deluding ideas which tell you, “Wait a little while, I will pray in an hour; first I must attend to this or that.” Such thoughts get you away from prayer into other affairs that so hold your attention and involve you that nothing comes of prayer for that day.” (Luther, *A Simple Way to Pray*, 1535)

- Praying aloud or writing helps

“Praying out loud can be helpful because it keeps you from getting lost in your head. It makes your thought concrete. But it is more than technique; it is also a statement of faith. You are audibly declaring your belief in a God who is alive.” (Miller)

- Putting time aside helps

“Learning to pray doesn’t offer a less busy life, but a less busy heart ... Time in prayer makes you even more dependent on God because you don’t have as much time to get things done.” (Miller)

Give thanks to God for the privilege of prayer. Pray for one another about the things discussed today.

“No book, no classroom, no course, no instructor can teach me so much about prayer that I can avoid the hard work of learning on my knees. Ultimately prayer itself is the classroom.” (Challies)

“A praying life isn’t something you accomplish in a year. It is a journey of a lifetime.” (Miller)

***Praying with Paul - A Call to Spiritual Reformation*, D. A. Carson** (Bakers Books, 2015). Theologically rich. Carson skilfully explores Paul's prayers and is pastorally sensitive to the struggles many face with prayer.

***Developing a Healthy Prayer Life*, James W. Beeke and Joel R. Beeke** (Reformation Heritage Books, 2010). 31 short devotional chapters to challenge and encourage one to prayer. Note: uses KJV bible, so takes more work. Helpful, encouraging and short.

***Prayer*, Timothy Keller** (Hodder & Stoughton, 2016). Theologically rich, pastorally astute and practically applicable. Keller outlines why we pray, what prayer is, the experience of prayer and practical suggestions for prayer.

***Prayerfulness*, Peter Adam** (Matthias Media, 2025). Encourages and equips those wanting to grow and deepen their prayerfulness in God's word. Includes many written prayers.

***A Praying Life*, Paul Miller** (NavPress, 2009). Leaves you wanting to pray. Very personal and addresses common struggles. Shares how prayer has changed his life.

Journey to the Cross, Wil Walker & Kendal Haug (New Growth Press, 2017). Devotional readings & reflections for Lent. Includes helpful observations & prayers about lament and suffering.

Method for Prayer, Matthew Henry (www.matthewhenry.org). Henry's extensive biblical prayers from the 1700s collated and adapted for modern use. The website allows you to select a Bible translation and choose between singular and plural prayers.

Pray for the World by Operation World. ed. Jason Mandryk (IVP, 2015) Statistics, information and prayer points for every country, enabling you to be informed as you pray for all nations. Suitable for personal or family / group use.

PrayerMate App. Well-designed prayer app for your phone or tablet. Import your own prayers in categories or choose from their free and paid feeds.

Collections of Prayers: These are often sourced from history and contain extensive, thoughtful wide-ranging prayers for many situations. e.g.

 - Prayers of lament – for times of struggle, doubt or grief. Use the following passages (or others):
 - ◇ Psalm 13, 22, 42, 73, 86, 88, 91, 102, 116, 142
 - ◇ Lamentations 3:19-33
 - ◇ 2 Corinthians 1:3-7
 - ◇ Philippians 4:6-7
